





















The Roman Leaders:

- The Three Herods:
 - Herod the Great

He was the ruler at the time of Jesus birth who confronted the Maggi and later had the male infants killed.

- Herod Antipas (Herod the Great's son)
 He was the 'King' appointed by Rome in power during the life and ministry of Jesus.
- Herod Agrippa I (Herod Antipas' son)
 He persecuted the early church. He had James put to death and imprisoned
 Peter. His death is attributed to the wrath of God in the New Testament.
 - Pontius Pilate

The Governor of Israel who ordered that Jesus be crucified



The Gospel According to Mark The Jewish Leaders:

• Pharisees

- Believed all of the OT was scripture
- Believed that relationship with god was maintained through obeying the law
- Believed in bodily resurrection after death
- Believed in the reality of angels and demons
- Objected to roman authority
- Attached to the synagogues

Sadducees

- Priestly aristocracy were based at the temple in jerusalem.
- They rejected the oral law or "traditions of the elders" held by the pharisees,
 and held rather to the torah (first 5 books of the ot) itself.
- They denied the resurrection, and perhaps angels or spirits.
- Most of jesus' conflicts were with the pharisees rather than the sadducees.



The Jewish Leaders:

Scribes

- Teachers of the law
- Might belong to either the Sadducee party or the Pharisee party
- Were often poor and depended on gifts from their students, funds from the distribution to the poor, or the temple treasury.

High priests

- High priests were powerful figures in first century Jerusalem.
- Had a vested interested in the religious status quo
- Probably gained financially from moneychanging and sales of sacrifices in the temple
- In Jesus' day the high priest was appointed by Herod, and served at the pleasure of the Roman Governor
- Often closely aligned with Roman interests.
